The information below should help resolve a wide range of display issues that can occur on our website when using Windows Vista or Windows 7.



Changing the Windows Vista Screen Resolution

1) Please right-click on your desktop and select 'Personalize' from the menu.




2) This will open the 'Personalization' Menu, select 'Display Settings', which appears at the bottom of the list.



3) The 'Display Settings' windows should appear, showing the current screen resolution:



4) Using the Slide Bar, change the setting to a minimum 1024 x 768. You will need to ensure that you 'Apply' the changes and then click 'OK'.




5) After clicking 'Apply', an additional prompt may be received asking you to confirm that the settings are correct. Provided you are happy, click 'Yes' to accept the settings.



Changing the Windows 7 Screen Resolution

1) Please right-click on your desktop and select 'Screen resolution' from the menu.



2) The 'Screen Resolution' window should appear, showing the current screen resolution:



3) Using the Drop Down Box, change the setting to a minimum 1024 x 768. You will need to ensure that you 'Apply' the changes and then click 'OK'.
